Planners call for repeal of solar ordinance

Pending repeal, solar developers crowd starting line

TIVERTON — The planning board last Tuesday. October 9, recommended that the town council repeal a solar ordinance the council had unanimously adopted on March 12, 2018, and that went into effect on that date (as Zoning Article XXIV Solar Photovoltaic System Development).

The repeal was recommended in order to allow time for the council, and planning and other town officials, time to amend the zoning ordinance in such a way as to address an influx of large-scale solar projects and solar building permits filed in recent months.

"We now have four major solar proposals banging on our door," said Planning Board Chairman Stuart Hardy at the meeting. "I'm feeling a little overwhelmed."

Even with a repeal agreed upon, it will take time to accomplish the repeal, considering notice requirements for public hearings, an intervening election of new council members and their swearing it, and so on. Until the existing ordinance is actually repealed and a new ordinance is adopted in its place, it is possible that consideration of solar development proposals proceed under the existing ordinance.

In calling for a repeal, the planning board's recommendation, made known at Tuesday's special meeting of the planning board, appeared to go further than the council had requested at its meeting on September 24.

Instead of recommending a temporary moratorium on solar development in Tiverton, which is what the council appeared to originally have asked for from the planning board — a temporary mora-

torium recommendation along with its suggestions for revisions to the solar ordinance — the planning board simply told the council that a moratorium would be unlawful — that it couldn't be done.

"A moratorium would make a lot more sense but we just can't do it,"Mr. Hardy

The planning board made its repeal recommendation based on a opinion from the town solicitor issued September 25, the day after the council had made its request (September 24) to the planning board for its recommendations about revisions.

And the solicitor's opinion about the invalidity of any possible moratorium was issued before the planning board posted an announcement of its special meeting October 9 to consider a moratorium and recommendations.

As the letter from Planning Board Chairman Hardy to the Town Council, dated October 10 (the day after the planning board's special meeting) put it:

"... the Town cannot legally legally enact an interim moratorium. However, the Town Council can repeal the current Ordinance through the zoning amendment process provided the Planning Board makes a recommendation to that effect, thre weeks of public notice is given and a Town Council Public hearing is sched-

The planning board made findings of fact upon which it says it based its actions. They included:

■ That "the Rhode Island Office of Energy Resources is very near adoption of a

model municipal solar energy ordinance that provides Rhode Island communities with policy guidance and should help us develop possible improvements;"

- That "much new and helpful information based on the recent solar energy experiences of other communities in the state is now available to the planning board;"
- That a moratorium "is not a legal option, but that a repeal is a viable alternative providing time to redraft the current

ordinance language."

■ That revisions of the existing ordinance must be consistent with the 2018 Tiverton Comprehensive Community Plan update.

Similar issues next door

Neighboring towns, especially Westport, are grappling with similar issues in the face of an onslaught of solar farm applications.

Tiverton pending solar projects

(As of 10-12-2018)

"All of these projects are considered Major Land Developments; therefore, each of them will require a) Master Plan approval, b) Preliminary Plan approval, and c) Final Plan approval by the Planning Board," said William Compton, Tiverton Town Planner.

■ 1) Wingover project (1519 Crandall Road)

72 acres (35 usable); Master Plan approved Sept. 11; R-80 zoned; Installation conditioned upon utility approval of interconnection.

19.12 acres (15.22 usable): Informal concept plan presented October 2, 2018; R-80 zoned

■ 2) Fogland project (4366 Main Road)

- 3) Brayton Road project (394 Brayton Road); 101 acres; Informal concept plan to be presented November 14, 2018;
- 4) Stafford Road project (960 Stafford Road); 62.5 acres; R-60 zoned; No appearance dates set yet before planning board.

In addition to the above four major land development solar projects, according to the town building and zoning office an estimated 4-6 building permits are pulled each month for roof-mounted solar dis-
